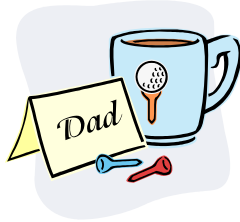

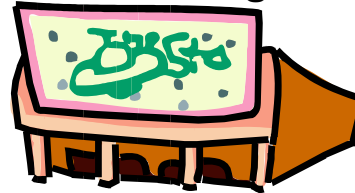

President's Report

I had intended to ask you to rejoice with me, because I thought that we have reached major milestones in our goal to mitigate flooding in Deerfield. We did make some strides, but we still have a major hurdle to overcome. Over the last month, I have learned more than I ever wanted to about how the County works. Let me give you a quick civics lesson. The Flood Control Division is responsible for the channel which traverses Deerfield. We lovingly call it the Ditch. The grate at Deerfield Village Drive, however, belongs to Precinct 3 which is responsible for roads and bridges. Moreover, that big tunnel which is guarded by the grate travels under the patio homes green belt all the way to Windsong Trails and Clay road. It belongs to our MUD. What do you think of that?

A major cause of our flooding was the grate getting clogged. The grate is designed to permit normal size debris to flow under it. Rushing water, however, uprooted huge plants growing in the silt on top of the concrete base of the ditch, and crammed them against the grate. Immediately after the flood on April 18, Precinct 3 cleaned their grate. They cleaned it again right before the flood of April 25. It didn't take a rocket scientist to realize that the root of the problem centers on getting rid of the plants. The Flood Control Division was contacted and, let's just say that they are not very cooperative. It is the most bureaucratic organization I have ever encountered. We will keep at them until the ditch is cleaned, so help me. Cleaning the ditch will not only mitigate the clogging problem, but will also open the sewer outlets coming from individual streets, thus helping to ease the possibility of flooding all through Deerfield.

Once the ditch is cleaned, we need to make sure that normal debris such as clipping following the three times a year mowing by Flood Control doesn't create another clogging situation. The Community Services Committee has a volunteer who will monitor the ditch. Their volunteer, who refers to himself as the Ditch Troll, will keep a journal of when the ditch is mowed and cleaned. More importantly, he will alert Precinct 3 whenever the grate needs cleaned. Precinct 3 has demonstrated their commitment of being proactive in keeping the grate clean. They came out after the rain showers of May 11th and 16th without being called to inspect and clean the grate.

Although the clogging of the ditch was the main source of our problem, we determined that some of the patio home storm sewers flow directly into that big tunnel. Therefore, they should not have been affected by the clogged grate. Our MUD has agreed to have those sewers checked for blockage. If the flow through them is found to be restricted, we will have identified another problem that was aggregating the major cause of flooding. I'll let you know what develops.

Ok, Precinct 3 and eventually the Flood Control bureaucrats will be doing their part. We too need to do ours. To this end, Deerfield Village is planning to participate in the County's SWIM Program. This program is designed to make people aware of the environmental harm that is done by disposing hazardous substances into catch basins. It also discourages people from putting grass and leaves into the storm sewer catch basins. Here is what we are planning. Starting in this issue, we are going to provide an insert or article relating to the program in each News Letter throughout the hurricane season. We are also planning, along with the Boy Scouts, to place plastic disks at each catch basin discouraging their use as a garbage can. Talk about synergy, we lessen the possibility of flooding in our neighborhood and improve the environment for everyone at the same time. Please read the information that will be provided and take it to heart. It is the right thing to do.

It's time to take the dogs for their jaunt on the green belt. Speaking of the green belt, if the wildflowers this year even approach the display we had last year, you will be missing something if you don't go see them. They seem to be a little slow this year, but hopefully, they should be in full bloom by the time you read this.

Deed Restrictions Committee

The Deeds Committee would like to say "Thank You" to all of you who have received violation letters and fixed the violation in a timely manner. We still have many issues in the neighborhood that we are actively trying to get resolved. We regret that we have had to start to involve our lawyer, but deeds is committed to enforcing the Protective Covenants to protect all Homeowners quality of lives. We obviously would prefer not to get a lawyer involved but have gotten to a point that we have no other options.

With the neighborhood aging we are seeing more violations but many violations are easy and cost free to fix. The biggest violation we are seeing right now is **GARBAGE CANS, TRASH DEBRIS, MULCH BAGS, AND MISC. ITEMS** being stored in sight of the street or out several days before pickup. All items **MUST** be stored out of view until the evening before trash pickup or stored behind a fence or in the garage. It costs you nothing to move your items behind the gate or in the garage but it does cost all homeowners money when we have to start sending letters to get the problem fixed! Another violation that can be fixed easily is minor mold on brick or siding. A spray bottle with a mixture of water and clorox can sometimes clear that problem up quickly. Remember you need architectural approval to do any outside work...roofs, fences, additions, pools...

The Deeds Committee's goal is to help insure that our neighborhood stays attractive and a desirable place to live. Please help us by keeping your property maintained. If you need a copy of the Protective Covenants or an Architectural Approval form visit the website: www.deerfieldvillage.net .

Swimming Pool Committee



The pool is now open on weekends, and will open on a daily basis once school ends. The first week day is Friday, June 5th. The pool will be open for general swim starting at 11:00 and will remain open until 9:00 PM.

Pool IDs' are required in 2009. The use of ID's has helped reduce non-resident use. If you have your card you will need to bring it by the office to be verified and get a sticker for it. Cards are being checked. Remember, you must be current on your Homeowner's Association dues to use the pool.

We have an excellent set of guards who will be staffing the pool this summer. The guards are there for our safety, and are responsible for keeping a safe pool. That means they are authorized to enforce pool rules such as no running, not entering the guard office and pump room, no unsafe horse play, etcetera. If pool users do not respond to the staff, the staffs can require swimmers to take time out, or even expel residents from the pool. Remember, the guards have responsibility for our safety.

Homeowners and their families living in Deerfield can use the pool. Homeowners who are renting will need to write a letter authorizing the renters/leasers to use the pool. Homeowners renting out their homes who authorize the renters to use the pool can not also use the pool. In all cases the homeowners must be current in their Deerfield assessments.

New Deerfield Rewards Program

As you all know, damage to property in Deerfield Village affects all residents. Not only is the damage unsightly, it is also expensive to fix. Did you know that the graffiti on the greenbelt can cost up to \$150.00 to remove each time? I feel quite certain that no homeowner wants to pay more in assessment dues just to repair, replace and remove what vandals do in our neighborhood. A proposal from the Security Committee was submitted and accepted by the DVCA Board which provides for a rewards program for damage done to Deerfield property. Information given to either the Constable Department or the Deerfield Office Manager that leads to the arrest and conviction of an individual(s) will be awarded to the informant. We are still in discussion as to the amount of the reward, but it will have limits and vary based on the damage. Stay tuned for future information about this exciting new program.



We will also be taking pictures of the damage and posting them to the WEB Site and in the Newsletter as needed. The Security Committee will also be more proactive in notifying Section Leaders and Block Captains as events occur. I feel that by providing these new/enhanced programs, we will have a much better pulse on crime in Deerfield and also provide a deterrent for these type activities.

Timely Tip for June Gardeners

Enjoy Summer Color



Spring flowers become but a memory as summer heats up! However, our desire for a colorful landscape can still be achieved. From annuals to perennials to shrubs to trees, color is found in blooms, foliage and even in the plumes of ornamental grasses.

The distinct patterns of Caladium leaves or textured foliage of Coleus adds interest to shady gardens. The dazzling Daylily or drought-tolerant Lantana provides splashes of blooms for full sun. Crape Myrtles are sending forth sprays of blossoms and the Esperanza displays clusters of bell-shaped flowers. Color abounds even in the heat of summer!

Remember to use **Calloway's premium soils and mixes** at the time of planting and water well with a Root Stimulator mixture. Also, add two to three inches of mulch to conserve moisture, help keep the soil cooler and prevent weeds from growing.

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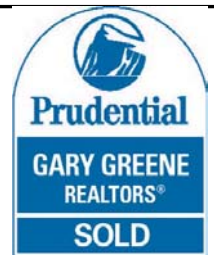
