

When you are walking your dog(s) on the greenbelt, please give the pedestrian(s) the right of passage by curbing your dog on the grass and off the sidewalk. This will make our walkers safe as well as the moms pushing baby carriages. Walkers, if you see someone that curbs their dogs for you, please thank them.

Important: If you walk you dog in the middle of the day, try to keep them on the grass...the sidewalk is too hot for their paws and will crack them. If it is too hot for you to go barefoot, it is too hot for your pet to walk on the sidewalk.

I would also like to suggest that children/ adults on bikes approaching walkers from behind let the walkers know you are coming close. Most bikes do not have bells on them, so a friendly "coming through" or "passing on the right/left" would do.

Practice Mosquito Control

With the recent rains, keep in mind to:

- ⇒ Empty, remove, cover or turn upside down any receptacle that would hold water.
- ⇒ Change water and scrub vases holding flowers or cutting twice each week—or grow cuttings in sand.
- ⇒ Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.
- ⇒ Stock ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish.
- ⇒ Fix or replace screens for doors and windows.

Mosquitoes develop only in water . . . And water standing just a few days can procure a crop of mosquitoes!

F rom the Deeds Committee

Hello neighbors. My name is Mike Nunez, and I am the chairperson for our community deeds committee. As you already know, we live in a deeded community. Therefore, it is our responsibility as your deed committee to ensure that we continue to keep our community the way we agreed to when we all purchased our homes.

I would just like to remind you all that when you want to remodel, add to, or just plain fix up your home, it is extremely important for you to obtain architectural approval from the deeds committee. If you are not sure if what you want to do needs approval, please call either myself, or the Recreation Center. You may pick up architectural approval forms at our Recreation Center.

As a friendly reminder, please remember to store trash cans out of view after trash days. Please inspect the outside of your home to ensure that mold has not formed on bricks or panels, or that the outside of your home might need painting. Check to see if fence pickets need replacing, or if the whole fence may need some work. Please mow, edge, and weed your property. Again, if you have any questions regarding deed violations, or potential violations, please contact me or contact the Recreation Center.

The last issue that I would like to address with you is that we are strictly a volunteer committee. We take time out of our schedules in order to inspect properties, and also we meet the second Monday of each month. We are not out to get anyone, we do not have a personal agenda, and we try and do the best job that we can. All I would ask you as neighbors is this: If you receive a letter regarding a violation, please try and resolve it as soon as possible. If you feel the letter has been sent where there is no violation, then please call us in a professional manner, with respect, and we can resolve the issue. We are receiving way too many angry phone calls, disputing the violation letter that has been received. I am not asking you do give up your right to dispute the violation; I am simply asking you to please do it in a professional manner. The alternative would be to dissolve the volunteer committee, and hire a professional management company to handle deed violations.

Thank you so much for your time, and let's work together to keep Deerfield Village a great community.

Wet or Dry

By Landscape Committee

If you look at a map of the world, you will see that Houston is on the same latitude as most of the world's major deserts. What keeps us from being one is moisture brought in by breezes from the Gulf of Mexico or by the subtropical jet stream from the Pacific ocean. However, as we saw this past June, changes in the weather pattern can give us periods of drought.

If this recent dry spell was fatal to anything in your landscape, consider replacing it with drought tolerant shrubs, flowers, ground cover or vines. Some of the hardiest flowers are coreopsis, blue plumbago, Mexican Fire bush, lantana and turk's cap. For ground cover consider Asiatic iasmine, dwarf rudbeckia, English ivy, and liriope. Hardy vines include honey suckle, passion vine, trumpet vine, and several varieties of jasmine,
