## President's Report

Greetings Deerfield Residents,

At the August Board meeting, we invited Harris County Precinct 4 representative Lillie Guichard to speak with us on two issues I had regarding 1) Lack of timely mowing of the road verge areas (both median and shoulder) surrounding Deerfield; 2) The reconstruction of the Windsong drainage ditch. The good news is that when Lillie arrived at the meeting, she told us that the areas had been mowed and they have a regular contractor now that will keep up with it. She mentioned with the two precincts realigned boarders, they had to get new contractors. She did not have an answer on the Windsong ditch, as they thought I meant the Greenbelt ditch. They are going to review with their engineers and get back to us. Several other residents asked other questions and Lillie left her contact information and flyers on county events they are having, including movie night.

We have another vacancy for a Trustee position on the Board, formerly filled by John Devine and his term runs until April 2023. I want to thank John for his service to our community as Trustee, and I'm know he will continue to help out when he can. Please pickup an application at the office or download it from our website if you are interested. The deadline to receive applications is September 23<sup>rd</sup>.

I mentioned this in the past, but I promised a resident that I would talk more about the architectural guidelines and the hard work that has been done for about two years now. We formed a special committee to create the original document, then sent it for review to our Deeds Committee, and now it is back in review with the architectural committee. This document is meant to guide both the Deeds Committee and residents interested in submitting an AA (Architectural Approval) form, in what is acceptable in Deerfield. The document should provide consistency in decisions made, as the current PC's (Protective Covenants) are very general. For example, when the PC's say, "Safe or Attractive or In Harmony or Neat or Healthful", what does that mean to you and me? Well, that is interpreted by the Deeds

Committee, and if in dispute...the Board. So why not give the residents clear guidance on what that is when possible. The Guidelines will in no way conflict with the Protective Covenants or Texas Property code, which protects resident rights. It will also create consistency with approvals when new volunteers join Deeds, and less subjective interpretation. A resident with knowledge of the rules is impowered. After all, we all want to keep Deerfield beautiful, and we want to keep the charm and unique benefits that keeps Deerfield above all the rest. This is a valuable document found in most subdivisions today. By far, we are the best kept secret in Houston area and want to stay that way. If you want to attend the meeting to see what it's all about, the next meeting is on September 21st at 4:30 pm.

Don't forget about the Monday Labor Day pool party at the Recreation Center between 2-6pm and we will also have a Music on the Green on 9/17 starting at 6pm. See inside newsletter for more information.

# Nothing but water should go down our storm drains

Do not dump chemicals down our storm drains, as they will make their way to the greenbelt ditch and be poisonous to our pets/animals drinking the water and/ or children playing. Please make certain that the grass/ yard clippings along curbs are bagged. In case of a heavy rain, these clippings will be swept into the sewer system and block the runoff water; which in turn will flood our streets.

#### **Residential Trash Reminders**

Our waste collection vendor is Texas Pride and trash pick-up is on Tuesdays and Fridays, with recycling pick-up on Fridays. Please do not put your trash at the curb earlier than the night before collection day. If you experience a problem with your trash service, please call Texas Pride first, and then the office if you are unable to get results.

## **Deeds Committee**

We send our "thank you" to all the residents who have been working on home repairs and yard clean up. For homeowners who have not begun the cleanup, please do so. Attention needs to be given to weekly mowing of yards, weeding plant beds, as well as edging of curbs. In addition, pick up any debris in yards and clean up any mold/mildew on the exterior of the home.

Have you turned in your project form? Deeds reminds homeowners to submit an Architectural Approval form (AA) to the office PRIOR to starting any repair, improvement, or addition to the exterior of your home or property. The form can be found on the Deerfield Village website under Documents/Deeds Documents at https://deerfieldvillageonline.com/deeds/

or contact the office for information. Deeds works hard to get your request forms approved as quickly as possible but always allow 5-10 days for processing. An AA is required to be submitted to the office if you would like to place a dumpster, POD, or temporary storage unit in the driveway on your property.

Also, NO contractor signs are allowed in resident yards per the Protective Covenants.

Reminder when replacing or installing a new fence that faces the street, visible from the street or common area, the nice flat side of the pickets must face out towards the street/or common area.

Please make sure that all garbage cans and recycle bins are to be REMOVED the same day after trash service has picked up. Trash pickup is on Tuesdays and Fridays therefore, please remember -DO NOT place TRASH OUT PRIOR to the night before. No one enjoys seeing trash sit for long. PUT TRASH CANS AWAY FROM VIEW.

Please evaluate the trees in your yard for pruning or removal if tree is dead. Remember when having a tree removed, have the stump "ground" and removed as well. Reminder not stumps are to be visible from the street view and should be removed. Remember that a homeowner is liable if any dead tree limbs fall on a neighbor's property and causes damage. Also, any low-hanging tree limbs over the street should be removed especially if the limbs are blocking a streetlight. Also, any tree or shrub needs to be trimmed so as not to obscure oncoming traffic or block the view of streetlights and/or stop signs.

As usual no boats, trailers, campers, or RV's may be parked on a homeowner's property for over 72 hours.

Any homeowner who has a sidewalk on their property's yard is responsible for the maintenance or replacement of that sidewalk.

# MUD 136 Report

Harris County Municipal Utility District 136 Board of Director's monthly meeting was held, in person, on Thursday August 11, 2022 in the DVCA Recreation Center.

The Board reviewed water and sanitary sewer operations from the previous month with presentations from our consultants, continued our discussions pertaining to the long-term Assessment Management and Replacement Plan being prepared by our District's Engineer, trash and recycling services, in addition to other agenda items pertinent to our District.

The Board continues its review and consideration of the asset management proposal that our District Engineer has prepared. In place inspections should begin shortly on portions of the sanitary sewer system within our District as part of an overall plan to assess the condition of the lines needed to prepare our plan to address necessary maintenance issues. This will be a relatively long-term program that is expected to continue over the next five years. Additionally on August 11 a subcontractor for AT&T installing fiber punched 2 4" holes through our 8" water main on Radworthy Dr at Bradstone Dr. Loss of service was experienced and a temporary patch was made. The MUD Operator is working with Harris County to complete repairs. Final plans haven't been finalized as of this writing, however, expect Radworthy Dr to be completely closed for a week while repairs are completed. The Director's of MUD 136 will demand AT&T cover the cost of all repairs.

With drought conditions expanding over much of Texas, the Houston area has moved into the "moderate" to "severe" designation. The West Harris County Regional Water Authority has alerted MUD 136 that they have implemented their "Stage I" drought contingency plan. MUD 136 has simultaneously entered our Stage I plan. This plan encourages our residents to implement wise water conservation measures on a voluntary basis in an effort to reduce consumption by 10%.

This year the shredding/paper recycling event will be on Saturday, October 22<sup>nd</sup>. As mentioned in our previous article, electronics re-cycling will not be offered due to lack of volume in 2021. This service is expected to return in the fall of 2023. If you have household hazardous waste, please check with Harris County for drop locations.

As a reminder residents can sign up to be included in the MUD's text alert system by texting "hcmud136" (without quotation marks) to 74121, creating an account using an email address at https://mobile-text-alerts.com/hcmud136. Registered residents will receive alerts about interruptions to water, sewer, trash service or other pertinent information.

Our next regular monthly meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 8th, at 6 P.M. At this meeting we will be discussing the increased cost of doing business from our vendors. We will continue in-person meetings based on the State of Texas open meeting rules. At this time, our meeting will take place in the Deerfield Village Recreation Center Clubhouse although we suggest that you visit our District website at WWW.HCMUD136. ORG for confirmation of the location.

#### **Tennis Committee**

All residents are asked to legibly sign up for court time with a FIRST and LAST NAME on the Sign in sheets located on the office window at the Recreation center. The player themself must sign up for the court. No more than 3 guests per resident and household when playing. Maximum time for reservations is 1.5 hours. All players are reminded to be respectful and considerate of other players during play and after play on the courts. Just a reminder that profanity, loud noises, radios, music and/or unsportsmanlike behavior is not allowed on the courts.

All players are reminded to ensure the tennis court gates are properly closed and locked after playing. Both court gates and locks are in proper working order.

The next Tennis Committee meeting will be at 8pm on Wednesday September 7, 2022.

In addition, we congratulate the Texas Christian High School Coaches and youth tennis players for their great performances and state championship awards earned. Great job!

## **Security Committee**

Our community continues to remain quiet from a security standpoint. Last month there were a few "crimes of opportunity" incidents where some residents did not ensure security by leaving garage doors open, cars unlocked, and items of value in sight. Unfortunately, every time a perpetrator has a success like cars unlocked it becomes less safe for all of us as they are motivated to look for another easy situation in Deerfield. There is someone driving an ATV and/or truck on the Greenbelt and in our sports field and tearing up the grass. If you see this happening, please call SEAL and try to get a license plate. We know this is one of our residents. If it is you – please stop, or if you know who it is – ask them to stop. If we catch the person, the Board will prosecute to the highest level legally allowed.

There still are a lot of parking violations occurring on our streets. The parking rules that apply to all of us have been published in a couple of the past few newsletters as reminders. We ask that you please park legally!

- Make sure your pet has a form of ID on their collar. Key tags are available 3 for \$2.00 at most hardware stores and work fine for pet ID's.
- Did you know that you can register your pet with Deerfield's Pet Hotline? Call Marie Nugent, 713-818-5799 for a Pet Hotline tag for your pet. The tag has Marie's home and cell phone number. She keeps a log with a photo, breed, pet's name, and your address, and phone contact numbers. A rabies tag is a great ID, but many Vets are not contactable 24/7 and the finder may not able to keep your pet for several days.
- If you have your pet microchipped, make sure you register on the database and keep your information current. Pets have been found wandering around the neighborhood and, when taken to the vet, found they were micro-chipped but the information was obsolete, thus making it harder to contact the owner.
- If you are going out of town and have a pet sitter, let Marie know your pets name, what it looks like (a picture is also great), and a contact number.
  - **Also-**Please be considerate and pick up your dog's poop when walking your dog. Our greenbelt is there for all of us to enjoy without stepping in dog poop!
- Please make sure your fence is secure so so your pets don't escape.
- PLEASE remember your pets, DON'T leave them in your hot car!

# <u> Men's Group</u>

#### **SERVICE PROJECTS:**

This past month TMG held another successful Food Drive to benefit our local food pantry, Mesa Outreach. In addition, we completed some misc. carpentry and electrical jobs. In addition, we did some power washing of the visible stains around the clubhouse and along stairs up to the annex. We also installed edging at several spots along the sidewalk to the school west of Red Lodge where the pipeline sand/silt has been washing off and creating a serious slipping hazard. TMG is re-stenciling the street names on the streets along the greenbelt. Another load of suitcases went to DePelchin Center for use by foster kids. We have surveyed the greenbelt sidewalks and are glad to report that only one repair is in the "must do" category for the rest of this year. TMG is looking at a cost-effective shade covering for the north end playground. Other projects include rebuilding the wooden enclosure for the greenbelt light controls at the north end, extending the flooring in the attic storage areas, and making repairs to the greenbelt exercise equipment. Due to the heat, we will not schedule any big outside jobs from mid-June to mid-Sept. The "old guys" need a break.

COMMUNITY SERVICE TMG members volunteer with Meals on Wheels, at the Special Pals animal shelter, at hospitals, including the VA, Mesa Outreach and the Houston Food Bank. Several members mentor at schools, help with the Boy Scouts, and work with St. Vincent de Paul to aid the needy. Words that guide us, "You can't help everyone, but everyone can help someone."

RECYCLING PLASTIC /FILMBAGS for TREX The manufacturer of our new perimeter fence has a program to recycle plastic films that our regular recycler won't take,i.e. grocery bags, bread bags, newspaper sleeves, etc. A collection bin is located in the gated area by the ice machine at the Rec Center. TREX does this because their material is a composite of wood and recycled plastic. We are sorting clean grocery bags and donate them to Katy Christian Ministries for their food distribution.

POOPF TMG diligently maintains the Poop Bag Dispensers (PBDs) on the greenbelt and keeps them stocked with bags. After a verbal spanking a couple of months ago in this newsletter dog walkers have been doing a much better job at picking it up--POOPF as in make it disappear!!. Just to make sure this continues we will add additional signage and decals to improve awareness.

FOOD DRIVE This month the Food Drive will be held Sept. 12-17. Please drop off your non-perishable donations in the box outside the office. Water bottles for the homeless can be dropped off at the pool area.

The Men's Group (TMG) meets weekly on Thursdays at 9:00 AM at the Rec Center. Besides our projects for DFV, and the community at large, we mix in some fun and fellowship which includes a monthly book club. In

the coming months we are looking forward to eating out a few times and taking a couple of "road trips." We usually have a monthly Astros watch party. If this sounds like fun, then come and join us.

# **Landscape Committee**

A little rain is nice but remember Harris County is still experiencing severe to extreme drought conditions and your water conservation efforts are important to the welfare of our entire community.

Many of Deerfield's trees are showing signs of stress related to the current drought coupled with the big freeze of 2021. The Landscape committee has an ongoing program to take down dead trees and trim dead branches. This work is ongoing and is prioritized according to an estimate of risk. Look for a lot of tree work activity this fall and winter. We are always happy to trim common area trees encroaching on resident's property. Please don't attempt to trim common area trees yourself. It is a violation of the protective covenant, and you could end up out of pocket for restitution for damage to community property. Continue to let the office know of your tree concerns and we will be happy to address them. We are addressing each concern one at a time and we have many areas of green space grounds to collaborate.

Landscape committee completed a survey of the condition of green belt and common area sidewalks. Generally, they are in very good condition. There are a few areas of concern that will be addressed in the coming months.

The Landscape Committee meets the second Monday of every month at 7:00 PM in the Small Conference room across from the office. Help keep our neighborhood beautiful and join our committee. Our next two meetings will be on Monday, September 12<sup>th</sup> and October 10<sup>th</sup>. Everyone is welcome to attend.

## **Community Services**

Whether this is your first summer in Houston or you've got a lot of history here, this is shaping up to be a rough one. After the hottest June on record, July and August are on pace to set a new record as well. As of mid-July, almost all of Harris County is in either Severe or Extreme Drought. Experts are predicting that the 2022 hurricane season will be above average to well above average. High surface water temperatures in the Gulf contribute to development of hurricanes, and the hot, dry weather we have been experiencing has been putting the warm surface water in place. Technically, Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 until November 30, but peak season is mid-August through September, and it is not unusual for June-July to be quiet (as they have been this year.)

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts 14-21 named storms this year and 6-10 hurricanes, of which 3-6 will be major hurricanes (Cat 3-5). According to Forbes, over the last 10 years the actual numbers have been within NOAA's predicted range 92% of the time for named storms and 82% of the time for major hurricanes.

All that says this would be a good time to go over hurricane preparedness!

Here are FEMA's hurricane season preparation recommendations:

- Prepare to evacuate. Have a "go bag" with medication and clothes, stock emergency supplies, such as a first aid kit and flashlights, secure a place to stay and research your local evacuation routes.
- Safeguard your home. Reinforce and secure your walls, doors, roof and windows. Secure lightweight outdoor objects, such as patio furniture and planters. If you can't carry an item inside, secure these items with an anchor.
- **Sign up for local alerts and warnings.** Sign up for texts, calls and emails to warn you about a hurricane. You may want to get an NOAA Weather Radio.
- Protect important documents. Use a waterproof container to store all financial documents, insurance cards, medical records, passports, birth certificates and other legal documents.
- Have emergency contacts. It's recommended to have an out-of-state emergency contact, as well as up-to-date contact information for work, school, doctors, non-emergency police, family members and doctors.

FEMA recommends you follow instructions by local authorities, in case of a hurricane. If your local authority advises evacuation, make sure to take your "go bag" and leave immediately. Additionally, do the following to stay safe:

- Stay away from the area until the authorities clear it as safe.
- Call 911 to help yourself or another person in danger.

- Use caution in high winds: stay clear of windows and get to the lowest level of an interior room.
- Steer clear or flooded roads or through water.

If you were here for lke in 2008 or Harvey in 2017, you know not to take hurricane season lightly!

The next meeting for the Community Services Committee will be on Labor Day-Monday, September 5<sup>th</sup> at 7pm in the Clubhouse at the Rec. Center. All residents are welcome!

**Comments:** Our financials continue to include several budget variances caused by budget timing: certain expenses had been budgeted but not all of the money was actually spent. We have adjusted for these items to show our true financial condition more realistically. The corrected net income numbers are those hi-lited in the summary above.

Collections: 2022 Regular Assessment: collection rate as of July 31 is 97.4%. This remains 0.3% less than the comparable rate a year ago, and 0.1% less than the same-date average for 2017 thru 2021. There are still 19 residents who have not made any payments at all toward their 2022 assessment, and if you are among them we would urge you to contact the office to set up a payment plan – yes, you can still do that! And, speaking of payment plans, of the 48 which have so far been set up for 2022 assessments, 35 have now been paid in full, and most of the others are paying on schedule and are in good standing. Five have fallen behind, unfortunately, and we would urge those residents to resume payments right away to avoid incurring additional charges.

2021 Special Assessment: As of July 31, 98.3% of the \$85 assessment per residence has been collected. This assessment was due on December 1 of last year, so if you haven't yet made payment please do as soon as possible. Checks should be mailed to the Deerfield office or dropped off there. If you haven't received your Special Assessment invoice or simply can't find it, please check with the office and we will provide a duplicate.




