President's Report

Greetings Deerfield Residents,

Important reminder, election day is Tuesday November 8th, from 7AM to 7PM. If you did not vote early, you can vote from at our community Clubhouse. This will be an official voting location, as we have done in the past.

The Board reviewed and approved the 2023 budget on October 17th Budget Special Board meeting. We made many cuts to the budget, but it was still necessary to make an increase to the yearly Assessment, as we continue to pursue a zero-deficit situation and adjust for inflation. Assessments were set at \$70 increase. Residents will receive an invoice by mid-November. The Assessment is due January 1st, 2023. If you desire a payment plan due to your current situation, please contact the office soon as possible for us to set this up.

The Deerfield Family Campout event will be November 5th-6th. This is the third year we are camping on the Green, but it is first time since Covid. Our Scout Troop will be available to help you with tent setup, and will be making a large campfire, and their famous cobbler. You can setup any time after 4PM, but cobbler and campfire will start when it gets dark... around 7PM.

In case of a heavy rain, these clippings will be swept into the sewer system and block the runoff water; which in turn will flood our streets.

Community Services

The Community Services Committee is responsible for the maintenance and repair of the Recreation Center facilities. Our most recent projects were the restriping of the parking lot, cleaning of the building gutters, replacing the basketball rim and repairing the Annex back stairs.

We have frequently been assisted by the Men's Group, who have made electrical repairs, washed the main room windows, and performed numerous other tasks. Community Services would like to thank the following TMG men for the extra help: Jay with trash every week, Dennis for the electrical work, Brian with the stair's carpentry, Bill with the painting and Mark K. with Mr. Deeds on our gutters! Lastly- a big thank you to Bob Shortle for all your time and efforts on helping 2 committees and TMG with small projects. TMG's latest project is recycling plastic bags. But wait, there's more than just bags! They also accept bubble wrap, overwraps of paper goods and bottled water, bread bags, dry cleaning bags, cereal bags, food storage bags, and stretch film wrap. All of these items can be deposited in the recycling boxes that are in the caged area next to the ice machine.

The Men's Group separates out the grocery bags, bundles them and ships them to Katy Christian Ministry, who use the bags in their food distribution. The remaining items are bundled and taken to Randall's, who have agreed to combine our materials with their own recycling. On the Rec Center grounds are blue recycling containers furnished by the Landscape Committee. Acceptable items are the same as for the weekly curbside recycling. It is very important not to put food items in these bins.

Squirrels can smell the food and have been chewing through the bottom of the container to get it. Food items must go in the black containers which are also furnished by the Landscape Committee.

Our regular pest control services are occurring on a regular basis for our facilities. The other vital participant in the Recreation Center maintenance is you. Please volunteer to helps us keep the grounds in top shape. Our next Committee meeting is Monday, November 7th at 7pm in the upstairs Annex.



Deeds Committee

Thank you to all the residents who have been working on home repairs and yard clean up. For homeowners who have not begun the cleanup, please do so. Attention needs to be given to weekly mowing of yards, weeding plant beds, as well as edging of curbs. In addition, pick up any debris in yards and clean up any mold/mildew on the exterior of the home.

The Midterm elections are here and political signs are allowed. Remember- 1 sign per candidate/ballot through the election date of November 8, 2022. All political signs must be **removed within 10 days after the election.** Reference the Association policies and guidelines, Section VI, f (1-2).

It will soon be time for Holiday decorations for the neighborhood to admire and enjoy.

Please remember to remove them in a timely fashion when the season is over.

Have you turned in your project form? Deeds reminds homeowners to submit an Architectural Approval form (AA) to the office PRIOR to starting any repair, improvement, or addition to the exterior of your home or property. The form can be found on the Deerfield Village website under Documents/Deeds Documents at https:deerfieldvillageonline.com/deeds/ or contact the office for information. Deeds works hard to get your request forms approved as quickly as possible but always allow 5-10 days for processing. An AA is required to be submitted to the office if you would like to place a dumpster, POD, or temporary storage unit in the driveway on your property. Also, NO contractor signs are allowed in resident yards per the Protective Covenants.

Reminder when replacing or installing a new fence that faces the street, visible from the street or common area, the nice flat side of the pickets must face out towards the street/or common area.

Please make sure that all garbage cans and recycle bins are to be REMOVED the same day after trash service has picked up. Trash pickup is on Tuesdays and Fridays therefore, please remember -DO NOT place TRASH OUT PRIOR to the night before. No one enjoys seeing trash sit for long. PUT TRASH CANS AWAY FROM VIEW.

Please evaluate the trees in your yard for pruning or removal if tree is dead. Remember when having a tree removed, have the stump "ground" and remove any stumps as well. No tree stumps are allowed to be visible from the street view and should be removed. Also, keep in mind that a homeowner is liable if any dead tree limbs fall on a neighbor's property and cause damage. Also, any low-hanging tree limbs over the street should be removed especially if the limbs are blocking a streetlight. Also, any tree or shrub needs to be trimmed so as not to obscure oncoming traffic or block the view of streetlights and/or stop signs.

As usual no boats, trailers, campers, or RV's may be parked on a homeowner's property for over 72 hours.

DEEDS meets the 2nd Monday of the month at 7pm in the Clubhouse. The next meeting will be held on November 14th. There will not be a meeting in December.

Comments: Our financials continue to include several budget variances caused by budget timing: certain expenses had been budgeted but not all of the money was not actually spent; conversely, we also had a major expense this month for which the budget falls later in the year. We have adjusted for these items to show our true financial condition more realistically, as shown in the hi-lited area of the summary above. There were also some major expenses this month which caused us to be over budget; hopefully, we should be able to get back on track before the end of the year.

Collections: 2022 Regular Assessment: collection rate as of September 30 is 98.1%. This 0.1% better than the comparable rate a year ago, and 0.3% better than the same-date average for 2017 thru 2021. There are still 13 residents (one less than last month) who have not made any payments at all toward their 2022 assessment, and if you are among them we would urge you to contact the office to set up a payment plan – yes, you can still do that! And, speaking of payment plans, of the 48 which have so far been set up for 2022 assessments, 36 have now been paid in full, and most of the others are paying on schedule and are in good standing. Five have fallen behind, and we would urge

those residents to resume payments right away to avoid incurring additional charges. In the past month, the Finance Committee has mailed reminder letters to those who have not begun steps to pay their 2022 assessments or have fallen behind on their pay plans. In addition, we have initiated the filing of liens against several residences for which assessments are two full years behind – a step we are always reluctant to take but is required to safeguard the interests of Deerfield. (In case you're wondering, the initial process of filing a lien costs nearly \$250 and will be charged back to the residents in question. Don't let this happen to you!)

2021 Special Assessment: As of September 30, 98.7% of the \$85 assessment per residence has been collected. This assessment was due on December 1 of last year, so if you haven't yet made payment please do as soon as possible. Checks should be mailed to the Deerfield office or dropped off there. If you haven't received your Special Assessment invoice or simply can't find it, please check with the office and we will provide a duplicate.

Please continue to be mindful and considerate for the safety and health of your fellow DV residents as we reopen the facilities and resume all of our events. The Pancake Breakfast, Music on the Green, Garage Sale, Paper Shredding/Electronics Recycling, and Halloween Trunk or Treat were all fun and successful events. Those who attended or participated enjoyed and gave it a thumbs up! The monthly Food Drive was held the week of November 14-19, and Coffee and Donuts has resumed at 9-10 am each Friday. DV Day Trippers are back on the road, and upcoming trips are planned for Nov.16 and Dec. 14. See details in this newsletter. Clubs that meet monthly (some weekly) are Yoga, Sewing Bees, Mahjong, Malties, Poker, Bunco, Ladies night and Mexican Train Dominos.

Swim Pool Committee

The Swim At Your Own Risk (S.A.Y.O.R.) program, where residents can swim during non-life guarded hours from 6am to 9pm, is still available until November 1st or at least up until the water temperature hits 72 degrees. Please note that there are certain SAYOR pool rules and signing of a waiver required each year for this program. For more information to enroll in the program call or email the Deerfield office. Though it's the off season, the Swimming Pool Committee still works to keep our pool sparkling and deck area looking good. We have ordered a replacement pump for the pool and are looking into how we can better ventilate our bathrooms. We are considering some off-season painting, as well. In January we anticipate installing our new, customized diving board. Our old one has served us well, allowing for many cannonballs and belly flops, but the base is rusted and the board is past its prime. Out with the old and in with the new! Also in January, we look forward to the polar bear swim. The SPC is a good group of committed residents. We always appreciate any help anyone is willing to give, as maintaining the pool is a year-round commitment. If you're interested, we meet the second Tuesday of the month at the Rec. Center. Due to the Elections, our next meeting is Wednesday, November 9th at 7pm in the Clubhouse.

Landscape Committee

Landscape is finishing out the year with planting fall color around the clubhouse and the main entrances. One more round of tree trimming and sidewalk repairs are in store November and December.

The leaves will be falling soon and remember it is the homeowners responsibility to clean up and disposes of leaves on their lawns responsibility. Nothing should go into the storm sewers except rain water.

We had a tough year with lawn maintenance what with the drought and disturbances on the pipeline easement area. But we finished out the season in pretty good shape and are looking forward to a smoother performance next year.

The Landscape Committee meets the second Monday of every month at 7:00 PM in the small conference room across from the office. The exception is there is no meeting in December. Help keep our neighborhood beautiful and join our committee. Our next two meetings will be on Monday, and November 14th and then we meet again in the new year January 9th. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Architectural Guidelines Committee

The AGC (Architectural Guidelines Committee) was established by the Board as a special committee to create Guidelines for Deeds and Homeowners to use and reference when considering or submitting an AA (Architectural Application). This would ensure that decisions made my Deeds would be consistent and fair over time, as volunteers come and go. These guidelines would also serve as a reference for any homeowner, as to what is approved or not approved. These guidelines would be supported by the existing PC's (Protective Covenants), current state laws (Texas Property Code), and Policies and Guidelines approved by the Board. This group meets twice a month, please reference the calendar in the newsletter to see dates/ times. Last month we got close to the end of the draft document. Once the draft is completely reviewed, it will go to legal to verify compliance with state laws and our governing documents. Once that edit is completed, it will be presented to Deeds and Homeowners for final review. I have been asked to host a Town Hall to cover the document, which will be eventually presented to the Board for approval in 2023. More information to come.

Holiday Safety Checklist

The holidays are upon us and along with the festivities we need to remember to be alert for criminal activity and overall personal safety

- When out shopping always be alert. Before leaving a store, always have your keys in your hand. Keep your cell phone close by, using only if and when necessary. Remember, if you are distracted by talking or texting on your phone, it is an open invitation to criminals.
- If you see something that makes you uncomfortable when walking to your vehicle, go back to the store and request an employee or security guard to watch or walk you to your vehicle.
- Do not leave packages or other valuables in plain view inside your vehicle as this is an invitation for criminals.
- 4. When shopping, watch your purse and bags, thieves watch for any opportunity to catch you unaware. Do not leave your child, purse or other purchases in your basket and walk away to look at something further down the aisle.
- 5. When at home, lock your doors and use your alarm systems. Keep your garage door closed.
- 6. If you are traveling, put your home on Vacation Watch with SEAL. Put a vacation hold on your mail and newspaper or have a neighbor collect them for you. If possible, set up timers to go on and off at various times so that it appears that someone is home.
- 7. During extremely cold weather, remember the 3 P's: Pets, Plants, and Pipes. Bring pets inside or provide a warm safe place for them to go, cover tender vegetation, and wrap pipes if needed. These precautions can save a lot of heartache and money!
- 8. Call and report any suspicious activity, persons, or vehicles you see right away! And in an emergency, Call 9-1-1!

MUD 136 Report

Harris County Municipal Utility District 136 Board of Director's monthly meeting was held, in person, on Thursday October 13, 2022, in the DVCA Recreation Center.

The Board reviewed water and sanitary sewer operations from the previous month with presentations from our consultants, continued our discussions pertaining to the long-term Assessment Management and Replacement Plan being prepared by our District's Engineer, trash and recycling services, in addition to other agenda items pertinent to our District.

The Board held the 2022 Tax Hearing. The tax rate was reduced per state law, and the effective tax increased. Unfortunately, the MUD is not immune to the general impacts of inflation and supply chain issues. Over the past year the district has experienced cost increases across all of our contractors. The increase in revenue should cover the increased cost of business over the next year. We strive to remain fiscally conservative when and where possible. Several members of the public were in attendance to ask questions and we hope we were able to answer them all. For our local area, we maintain the lowest tax rate at \$0.155/\$100 valuation. The next lowest is JRPUD at \$0.265/\$100.

Repairs to the surface streets around Bradstone Dr and Radworthy have been completed and through traffic access has been restored. The District is pursuing AT&T for the full cost of repairs and remediation.

With drought conditions expanding over much of Texas, the Houston area has moved into the "moderate" to "severe" designation. MUD 136 is following the lead of WHCRWA for our drought status, at this time we remain in "Stage I" conditions.

This year the shredding/paper recycling event will be on Saturday, October 22nd. It's estimated 5,500lbs of paper was collected and diverted from local landfills. This will be turned into soft paper products. The DVCA Men's Group ran the e-cycling and hauled off a full box truck, keeping these toxic elements out of our local landfill. All together a successful day. Thank you to all who participated.

As a reminder residents can sign up to be included in the MUD's text alert system by texting "hcmud136" (without quotation marks) to 74121, creating an account using an email address at https://mobile-text-alerts.com/hcmud136. Registered residents will receive alerts about interruptions to water, sewer, trash service or other pertinent information.

Our next regular monthly meeting is scheduled for Thursday, November 10th, at 6 P.M. We will continue in-person meetings based on the State of Texas open meeting rules. At this time, our meeting will take place in the Deerfield Village Recreation Center Clubhouse although we suggest that you visit our District website at WWW.HCMUD136.ORG for confirmation of the location. The public is always welcome to attend.

<u>Men's Group</u>

SERVICE PROJECTS:

This past month TMG held another successful Food Drive to benefit our local food pantry, Mesa Outreach and we completed some misc. carpentry and electrical jobs including a repair of the ice machine. In addition, TMG has completed stenciling the street names on the streets along the greenbelt. Lots of positive comments from residents about the new snazzy two-tone design. We replaced all the railings and balusters on the annex landing and then painted. We continue to dig channels to let the water runoff from the sidewalks along the new water pipeline R.O.W. TMG rebuilt the enclosure that houses the controls for the greenbelt lights at the north end. In support of the removal of the huge tree at the playground TMG removed the metal benches and picnic table, then afterwards reassembled them and made repairs. - Make sure your pet has a form of ID on their collar. Key tags are available 3 for \$2.00 at most hardware stores and work fine for pet ID's.
- Did you know that you can register your pet with Deerfield's Pet Hotline? Call Marie Nugent, 713-818-5799 for a Pet Hotline tag for your pet. The tag has Marie's home and cell phone number. She keeps a log with a photo, breed, pet's name, and your address, and phone contact numbers. A rabies tag is a great ID, but many Vets are not contactable 24/7 and the finder may not able to keep your pet for several days.
- If you have your pet microchipped, make sure you register on the database and keep your information current. Pets have been found wandering around the neighborhood and, when taken to the vet, found they were micro-chipped but the information was obsolete, thus making it harder to contact the owner.
- If you are going out of town and have a pet sitter, let Marie know your pets name, what it looks like (a picture is also great), and a contact number.
 - Also-Please be considerate and pick up your dog's poop when walking your dog. Our greenbelt is there for all of us to enjoy without stepping in dog poop!
- Please make sure your fence is secure so so your pets don't escape.
- PLEASE remember your pets, DON'T leave them in your hot car!

Sec. 6-4. Running at large of domestic animals or fowl prohibited.

- (a) The running at large of domestic animals or domestic fowl is hereby declared to be a nuisance. It is unlawful for an owner to permit any animal or fowl to run at large.
- (b) It shall be a defense to prosecution under subsection
- (a) above that the animal was:
- (1) A dog in an off-leash site established under section 32-11 of this Code; or
- (2) A feral cat that is a part of a trap, neuter, and return program.





